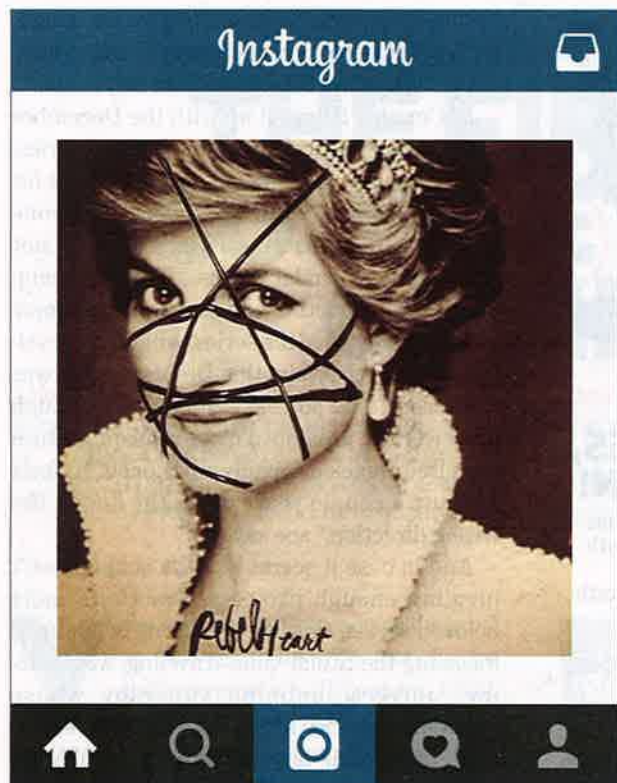

Princess Di gets the *Rebel Heart* treatment on Instagram

INSTA-IMPLOSION



In early 2014, Instagram was Madonna's friend, and she used it to update fans on her upcoming album, *Rebel Heart*. But when unapproved new music appeared online during the holidays, the icon had to completely rearrange her release strategy. And all of *that* happened before the cover-art-meme controversy currently plaguing her. Here's how it went down. —KYLE ANDERSON

Nov. 28

Two songs purported to be from Madonna's upcoming release surface online. Manager Guy Oseary tweets, "I would be grateful to any @madonna fans that can assist us in finding those responsible for the leak. We appreciate your help."

Dec. 4

Madonna posts a photo of a smashed iPod, writing, "My music has been stolen and leaked! I have been violated as a human and an artist!"

Dec. 17

Oseary's plea fails to produce an offender, and 13 Madonna tracks arrive online in various states of completion, coming from an album rumored to be titled *Iconic* or *Unapologetic Bitch*. Madonna declares them "unfinished demos stolen long ago" and declares the leak "artistic rape."

Dec. 20

Madonna officially announces the new album, which is called *Rebel Heart* and will

be released on March 10. The iTunes pre-order comes with six tracks available for instant download, including the first single, "Living for Love." Producers include Kanye West, Diplo, and Avicii. *Rebel Heart* tops iTunes charts in more than 35 countries.

Dec. 21

After *Rebel Heart* cover-art memes begin to surface, with people wrapping black wire around their faces, Madonna

tells *Billboard* that the leaks have completely changed the way her team operates. "We're not on the Internet," she said. "Hard drives of music are hand-carried to people." She also teases a possible performance at the Grammy Awards.

Dec. 23

Another 14 unauthorized demos arrive, including the Pharrell Williams collaboration "Back That Up (Do It)."

Dec. 24

Three more songs appear, including a track called "Two Steps Behind Me" that sounds so much like a Lady Gaga dis track that Madonna is forced to address it. "We still live in a world that discriminates against women," she said via Instagram three days later. "Their are People that are so hateful they want to create feuds between strong women that do not exist! I do not wish ill will towards any other female artist and i never have... i will not apologize Or defend my unpublished, unfinished, STOLEN work"

Dec. 27

Oseary reveals on Twitter that the original plan was to release *Rebel Heart* at the end of April, and that Madonna recorded so many demos because it was meant to be a double album.

Jan. 2

Madonna apologizes for posting photos of Nelson Mandela, Jesus Christ, and Jean-Michel Basquiat getting the *Rebel Heart* meme treatment. "I'm sorry," she wrote on Facebook "I'm not comparing my self to anyone." As of press time, the leaks have stopped, but their source remains a mystery.
